Starvation in Zambia 2006

For the past four years, there has been drought in Southern Africa. As a result, the people have been unable to grow corn, their staple food. The conditions have steadily worsened, and presently the people are faced with starvation. In February 2006, NAPS journeyed into Zambia to bring much-needed reinforcement to the NAPS Zambia group, which was working hard to meet the needs of the people. They trucked in more food and offered additional manpower. Each day NAPS provided a meal; and people walked from their villages, miles away, to receive their only meal for the day. The need was so great that the NAPS Zambia group dispatched a second group to another location. This allowed twice as many people to be fed. In addition to filling their physical need, NAPS provided spiritual food. Before the feeding programs began, they shared the love of God with the children through songs, skits, Bible texts, and best of all, hugs!




The Home Mission

NAPS has continued the relief started months ago in hurricanestricken Lake Charles, LA. They have visited schools encouraging both the displaced students and teachers to be strong and not to give up. Their main focus has been to empower the youth to follow in the footsteps of Christ. At several schools, appeals have been made and students have taken a stand for Christ and are helping in their communities.

Inner-City Missions

NAPS volunteers also bring God's love to the people of Huntsville, AL. The primary focus of this mission is to teach and train the youth of Huntsville to serve their community. This program begins with the NAPS children's program consisting of songs, crafts, and Bible studies, followed by children going into the community with NAPS to feed the homeless. One volunteer stated that "I have not experienced a greater joy than that which comes from doing service for others."

Each week, NAPS goes into the community of Decatur, AL and shares God's love. When we first began, we had to knock on the doors and wait; now the children run to greet us. These weekly programs designed for the children teach them about the Bible, God's Love, the Sabbath, and much more. We taught the children Bible texts that supported these topics and watched as they had fun learning. We also started a children's choir.

Equipping Others for Service - Guyana '06

NAPS volunteers sacrificed their Christmas break to bring relief and support to Guyana. NAPS provided aid to the community, including the construction of houses for victims of a ood. Along with providing individual assistance in the region, NAPS also catered to the overall well-being of the community by providing daily programs for adults and children. These programs consisted of Bible stories, crafts, games, and also included information on HIV/AIDS, drugs, social welfare, and the Bible. The culmination of the mission was marked by a baptism which resulted in people making a public declaration of their love for Christ.

Fall 2005, a group left for California on a year-long mission. Arriving there, they provided meals for the homeless and brought encouragement to churches and schools. Youth were taught the importance of education, non-violence, AIDS prevention, and community service. NAPS also visited juvenile detention centers and hosted an anti-AIDS march in the city of San Francisco. One of the most powerful events of the California mission was the prayer ministry held on the streets of San Francisco along with the distribution of literature.

Summer 2005, NAPS arrived in India to embark upon one of the most extraordinary missionary ventures many would ever experience. India, a place of remarkable beauty, strength, and diversity, is often also the scene of unimaginable social and economic turmoil. African India people, who were brought to India from Africa during the Arabian slave trade, are the relatively unknown and forgotten survivors of slavery. This group of people were subject to social segregation, degraded by menial labor, and widely denied education. NAPS lived and worked with the African Indians for five weeks providing food and presenting educational and evangelistic programs. This resulted in countless families forsaking idolatry to serve Jesus. One hundred and eighty three were baptized. Among those were 15 African Indian students who had been trained by NAPS. Today, they have started their own NAPS branch and are fervently continuing through the villages of India, spreading the Gospel, feeding the children, and also responding to national natural disasters.


Torrey Price & Darla Partlow Huntsville, Alabama
